From The Deacon's Bench

Dear Beloved Community,

On November 13, 2021 at 3:32 I lost my partner and companion of 62 years and 9 months. A husband, father, grandfather, great-grandfather, brother and uncle quietly slipped away like the vanishing ghost horses of a Minnesota dawn.

We said our broken hearted good-byes as a family on November 14, 2021 and we said our communal good-byes again with friends and neighbors on November 19, 2021. And we, his family, have been saying the longest good-bye every day for the last several years. He struggled with progressive dementia or Alzheimer's or whatever you call the thief that robs loved ones of memory and cognitive processing. He was a gifted carpenter who no longer could remember how to build; a meticulous financial overseer who no longer could balance a checkbook; a former Twin Cities commuter who no longer could remember how to get to his brother's house in our small town; a husband who couldn't remember that his wife was downstairs sewing or outside watering flowers and went looking for her because he thought she was lost.

These were the initial birthplaces of grief, of unwanted good-byes as small brittle pieces of memory broke off in front of us, and small pieces of confidence began to slip away. Yet surprisingly, as his world became smaller he remained upbeat...content to read his morning paper even though he couldn't retain what he read but said he just "liked reading the words." He watched every kind of team and ball game without knowing who was playing or winning but the joy was in the act of spectatorship and it still felt normal.

It was we who struggled, powerless to intervene, powerless to halt the losses, grieving the role reversals, becoming exhausted by the 24/7 care taking responsibilities, struggling with maintaining hope, patience and understanding. In poet Mary Oliver's words, it felt "like a box of darkness."

"Someone I loved once gave me a box of darkness it took me years to understand this, too, was a gift."

His last days at the Palliative Care Unit at the VA were peaceful, full of attentive care by the medical staff and vigilant care by our children and their spouses.

We shall remember and grieve and celebrate the gift of his life to us, his family. And I shall celebrate with my children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren the importance of loving others and life despite pain and losses. In my favorite poet Mary Oliver's words:

To live in this world you must be able to do three things: to love what is mortal;


to hold it against your bones knowing your own life depends on it;

and, when the time comes to let it go, let it go."

So, my dear family and friends, you graced me with your support and comfort, you strengthened me and cheered me on; I bless you for your loving kindness. May the Lord of us all continue to bless each and every one of you. I couldn't have done this without you.


Last month we celebrated Veteran's Day. The Cathedral is very fortunate to have several members who served our country, including Gary Andersen and Jim Glynn.

The Cathedral And Climate Change

The biggest problem to be solved regarding climate change is the release of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere. The carbon dioxide we create can no longer be absorbed by the natural environment. A recent study analyzing the amount of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere using ice core samples from the Greenland ice pack found that since 1780 (around the time of the beginning of the industrial revolution) and today the level of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere has doubled.

There are choices we can make to help reduce our present carbon dioxide release.

Currently in Minnesota the largest source of carbon pollution are cars and trucks. The freedom that having ones own vehicle allows us is to have is something that is very important to most people, Buying ones first vehicle seems to me to be one of the secular world's rites of passage.

When one owns a vehicle however one can follow a mindful use of that vehicle. When planning ones day instead of making multiple trips one can set up a route, for example, where one goes to an appointment and then stops to get groceries and/or picks up medicines all in a logical sequence. When driving a street that has a series of stoplights one often drives in a manner in which one can hit most of the lights green rather than speeding between lights and having to sit idling.

One of the saddest developments recently is the number of people who are choosing to drive at excessive speeds on the highways. The amount of extra gasoline it takes to propel a vehicle at 80 to 90 MPH is considerable as well as putting the lives of people sharing the highway in danger.

One of the entertainment options that I personally can't understand is some people's fascination with cars going around in an oval at high speeds. If one considers the amount of carbon released in the millions of gallons of gasoline used serving no productive purpose on the racetracks in this country it seems to me wasteful.

There are some hopeful advances coming regarding personal vehicles. I'm waiting to see if electric vehicles are going to be truly functional in Minnesota during the winter. When the bugs are worked out my next car will be electric.


